
Background Partners Contribute Media Datasets





Process for data rescue		
	 Check the <u>data rescue tracker</u> to see if the data have already been rescued. 	
	1b. Decide which agency you are most interested in collecting data for. There are different tabs at the bottom of the document. If you would like to rescue data and do not see a tab for the agency or office, feel free to add a new tab.	
	2. Review the MIT Checklist for data rescue in the US	
	3. Add your information to the relevant row in the Agencies tab (for example: IMLS or MBDA). Many of the tabs already have datasets listed so you may be able to skip this step	
	4. Capture ALL necessary information and documentation in addition to data files, if they are data related (e.g., codebooks, data dictionaries, metadata, data stories). If the site does not contain data, make a note of it (these pages can still be nominated to EOT, but documents not relevant to data should not be loaded into Data Lumos)	
	5. Organize the documents and data in a logical fashion (i.e., by year)	
	Flag any datasets that are behind explorer tools or otherwise difficult to download. These can be indicated in the Data Downloadable column.	
	 Nominate the links of dataset to the <u>U.S. Government Web & Data</u> Archive 2025 (this replaces the EOT web archive as of 2025-04-01) 	
	8. Zip the files.	
	Submit the data files to <u>Data Lumos</u> .

	Data Added (Y/N/IP)	Has a link to the data been added to the spreadsheet





Public Environmental Data Partners


The Public Environmental Data Partners are **committed to preserving and providing public access to federal environmental data.** We are a volunteer coalition of several environmental, justice, and policy organizations, researchers across several universities, archivists, and students who rely on federal datasets and tools to support critical research, advocacy, policy, and litigation work. To gather insights on what data to preserve, we reached out to our networks, which consist largely of environmental justice groups and networks, state and local government climate offices, and academic researchers. We compiled a large list of federal databases and tools, and prioritized them based on their relative impact, our confidence that we could archive them, and the relative effort it would take to obtain and archive them.





What's going on with Government Information?

The news media has <u>widely reported</u> the current U.S. administration's <u>removal</u> and <u>modification</u> of federal <u>websites</u> and <u>information</u>. As academic librarians, we have also heard from faculty and researchers about their work <u>being removed</u> without notice, and received many questions from academics and the public about how widespread this phenomena is.

Librarians, data experts, and others have launched many excellent projects to preserve missing information and data. In particular, we take inspiration from projects including the long-standing End of Term Archive, the newer Data Rescue Project, and many others. While removed or threatened data has been well-tracked by various data rescue groups, we hope to supplement these efforts by focusing on tracking non-data materials and information that have been impacted.

Future questions

- What happens to restricted access data?
- What is the impact on data integrity and data collection?
- How do we create infrastructure to support efforts like these over the longer term?
- How create infrastructure for the next time ... or the next country?
- How do we sustain the community we've built across professions and international borders?
