Vania Ceccato, Seminar chairman, Royal Institute of Technology (KTH), Sweden



Vania is an associate professor at CEFIN, School of Architecture and the Built Environment, Royal Institute of Technology (KTH) in Stockholm, Sweden. Her research interests are geography of crime, rural crime and crime prevention in rural areas, transit crime, gendered safety, individuals' mobility and spatial data analysis. She has published in international journals, mostly in geography, criminology and urban planning, and is editor of *The Urban Fabric of Crime and Fear* in 2012 and author of *Moving Safely: Crime and Perceived Safety in Stockholm's Subway Stations* in 2013. She is currently writing a book about rural crime and community safety in Sweden. Vania has also been engaged in the debate about Swedish police reorganisation and its potential impact on community safety in rural areas.

#### Elaine Barclay, University of New England, Australia



Elaine is an associate professor in Criminology at the University of New England, Armidale New South Wales. Over 20 years, Elaine has undertaken research on crime on farms, crime in rural communities, Aboriginal Australians and the criminal justice system, tourism/leisure and crime, farm succession, biosecurity, environmental crime and environmental law, illegal hunting and trespassing, attitudes to the environment and to climate change, property rights, and the social impact of water trading. She is editor of Crime in rural Australia (with John Scott, Joseph F Donnermeyer, Russell Hogg), by Federation press, 2007. She convened two international conferences on rural crime in 1999 and 2006 which facilitated a network of scholars with an interest in this field and an International Journal of Rural Criminology now managed at Ohio State University.

### Walter DeKeseredy, West Virginia University, USA



Walter is Anna Deane Carlson Endowed Chair of Social Sciences and a professor of Sociology at West Virginia University. He has published 19 books and over 160 scientific journal articles and book chapters on violence against women and other social problems. In 2008, the Institute on Violence, Abuse and Trauma gave him the Linda Saltzman Memorial Intimate Partner Violence Researcher Award. He also jointly received the 2004 Distinguished Scholar Award from the American Society of Criminology's (ASC) Division on Women and Crime and the 2007 inaugural UOIT Research Excellence Award. In 1995, he received the Critical Criminologist of the Year Award from the ASC's Division on Critical Criminology (DCC) and in 2008 the DCC gave him the Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2014, he received the Critical Criminal Justice Scholar Award from the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences' Section on Critical Criminal Justice.

#### Joseph Donnermeyer, The Ohio State University, USA



Joseph is a professor in the Rural Sociology program at The Ohio State. He has conducted research on levels of victimization and attitudes toward crime among rural people, the extent and pattern of offending by rural populations, especially the etiology of substance use by rural youth, crime against agricultural operations, and numerous evaluations of crime prevention programs. Dr. Donnermeyer is the author (co-author) of over 100 peer reviewed journal articles, book chapters, and books on issues related to rural crime and rural societies. He is author of Rural Criminology (with Walter DeKeseredy) by Routledge, 2013. Currently, he is writing a monograph for the critical criminology series of Lexington Books, utilizing a critique of social disorganization theory and the concepts of collective efficacy and social capital to reexamine the relationship of social structure to crime in the rural context. He is a trainer in various executive development and leadership programs through the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police, the Ohio Fire Chiefs Association, and other organizations.
