



Tasks to Solve During Seminar 1

Internet Applications, ID1354

Write a document with your answers to the following tasks, and upload it to Bilda at the end of the seminar. The format of the document is not important. Only one document per group is required, each group member uploads the same document.

Mandatory Task

All members of the group shall, in turn, explain and motivate their program to the other group members. Write a brief summary of differences, and comment on advantages and disadvantages of the different solutions. Do not write about minor layout differences.

Optional Tasks

Solve as many of these tasks as time allows, and write your solutions in the same document as the mandatory task. If the solution is a piece of code, just paste the code in the document, without bothering about figures or formatting. The tasks may be solved in any order, you do not have to start from task one.

Task 1, Selectors

CSS selectors are much more powerful than what is mentioned in the lecture notes. Take a look at combinators, pseudo-classes, attribute selectors and pseudo-elements at w3schools (http://www.w3schools.com/css/css_combinators.asp, http://www.w3schools.com/css/css_pseudo_classes.asp, http://www.w3schools.com/css/css_attribute_selectors.asp http://www.w3schools.com/css/css_pseudo_elements.asp) and test some complex selectors (for example in firebug).

Task 2, Assigning a Property Value

It is sometimes difficult to understand why a certain CSS property gets the value it gets. Try to get a good understanding of the cascade process by creating CSS rules with different specificities. This is covered on slide 65 in the lecture notes from lecture three. Also try to specify the **inherit** and **initial** property values. As a starting point, you can use the CSS and HTML in listings 1 and 2 below.
