Language of instruction

The language of instruction is specified in the course offering information in the course catalogue.

Intended learning outcomes

The aim of the course is to provide

- basic knowledge about planning theory;
- understanding of and knowledge about planning as a process and about the actors holding roles in the process;
- knowledge about the interplay between public and private actors in urban and regional planning;
- understanding of and knowledge about different actors' resources, motives and incentives to participate in the planning process.

Course contents

In the course basic planning theory is discussed, which include important concepts and the development of planning theory over time. The course focuses on actors that participate in or is affected by planning. Questions about communication, incentives and power are central for the course. The meaning of and the relation between public and private interests are discussed in detail.

In the course, the organisation and the implementation of the decision and planning process is discussed with a starting point in contemporary planning praxis. This includes a discussion of the relation between planning systems and processes at local, regional and national level. In the course focus is directed to different actors and their roles and interplay in planning. Hence, the relationship between private and public interests is stressed, as well as citizen participation.

Theoretical lectures are mixed with lectures about concrete planning issues and examples from planning practice. The interplay between public and private actors is exercised in game sessions. A project task comprises a case study of a specific planning process.
