The language of instruction is specified in the course offering information in the course catalogue.

Intended learning outcomes

The students shall after taking this course:

- be able to describe different kinds of decision support systems and explain their function
- be able to describe and explain how decision support systems can be used in different kinds of organisations
- be able to analyse a typical decision situation in the finance market or estate management, and to apply relevant theory in order to evaluate different alternatives
- be able to evaluate the impact decision support systems have on organisations and their operation.

Course contents

The basics of decision theory, data mining, neural networks, artificial intelligence, and data warehousing.

Course literature

The textbook "Business Intelligence -- A managerial approach" by Turban, Sharda, Delen and King (Pearson ISBN 978-0-13-247882-3) broadly covers the material in lectures 5--10.

Lectures 1--4 treat basic decision theory and game theory, and will be covered by handouts which will be downloadable from the course home page. The book "Introduction to Game Theory in Business and Economy" by Webster (M.E. Sharpe, ISBN 978-0-7656-2237-2) is recommended for those interested in a deepened understanding of these topics.
