Intended learning outcomes

After completing this course the student should be able to

- 1. recall and apply basic concepts in artificial intelligence
- 2. solve problems from the AI domain
- 3. demonstrate an insight into the risks of AI and its role in society
- 4. present work

so that the student can

- make use of methods from artificial intelligence in the analysis, design and implementation of computer programs in academic as well as industrial applications
- in an appropriate way present results and solutions.

Course contents

The following areas will be treated in the course: problem solving with search algorithms, heuristics and games, knowledge representation (logic), representing uncertain knowledge and reasoning (Bayesian networks, HMM), decision and utility theory, communication and models for probabilistic language processing.
