Intended learning outcomes

After completing this course, the student will be able to follow the derivations and subtleties of a number of results available in publications in Electrical Engineering, and to eventually contribute to the underlying theories of this field.

Course contents

Introduction; Inner product spaces; Normed spaces; Hilbert and Banach spaces; Orthogonal expansions; Least squares estimation; Dual spaces; Contraction mappings / Banach fixed point theorem; Linear operators and adjoints; Optimization of functionals; Application to H_∞ control theory.

Lectures, homework exercises, final project (presentations on selected topics by the participants)
