Bachelor's degree within a program that contains: 75 credits (hp) in chemistry or chemical engineering, 20 credits in mathematics, 6 credits in thermodynamics and 6 credits in programming or equivalent.

The language of instruction is specified in the course offering information in the course catalogue.

Intended learning outcomes

After completing the course, the students should be able to:

- Describe different separation techniques and the practical design of the apparatus (TEN1, PRO1)
- Describe the underlying principles behind different separation techniques (TEN1, PRO1)
- Apply basic principles to design specific separation processes (TEN1, LAB1)
- Motivate and critically examine the choice of a separation technique for a specific purpose (PRO1)

Course contents

The course comprises fundamentals, basic requirements, and design principles for separation processes. Detailed descriptions and analyses of common unit operations are given. The fundamental mechanisms of phase equilibria and mass and/or heat transport and how the mathematical description of these mechanisms can be used in the design are also treated, as well as matters concerning the practical design of apparatus. The course has particular emphasis on energy efficiency and the environment.

Examination

- LAB1 - Computer laborations, 1.5 credits, grading scale: P, F
- PRO1 - Project assignment, 1.5 credits, grading scale: P, F
- TEN1 - Written exam, 4.5 credits, grading scale: P, F

Based on recommendation from KTH's coordinator for disabilities, the examiner will decide how to adapt an examination for students with documented disability.
