Language of instruction

The language of instruction is specified in the course offering information in the course catalogue.

Intended learning outcomes

The overall purpose of the course is that the student should get well acquainted with basic concepts, theory, models and solution methods for optimization. Further, the student should get basic skills in modelling and computer based solving of various applied optimization problems.

Course contents

Examples of applications and modelling training. Basic concepts and theory for optimization, in particular theory for convex problems. Some linear algebra in R^n, in particular bases for the four fundamental subspaces corresponding to a given matrix, and LDLT-factorization of a symmetric definite matrix. Linear optimization, including duality theory. Optimization of flows in networks. Quadratic optimization with linear constraints. Linear least squares problems, in particular minimum norm solutions. Unconstrained nonlinear optimization, in particular for convex problems. Lagrangian relaxation.

Course literature

Linear and Nonlinear Programming by Nash and Sofer, McGraw-Hill, and some lecture notes.
